This land south of Dunwich on North Stradbroke Island used to be a mineral sands mine. Since 1985 Unimin's award winning rehabilitation processes have reformed the topography and bushland which is now once again a recognised Koala habitat.

How can this happen? Because the precious and useful minerals in sand only account for 1% of the volume of sand mined. The vast majority goes back to the Island, and Unimin's long-term commitment to rehabilitation returns it to a balanced ecosystem.

Unimin believes in a Sustainable Stradbroke. We are committed to working with the traditional owners, the broader community and governments to achieve this.

A balanced approach to mining and environmental management is in the best interests of the environment, the community and the economy.

If a fair agreement can be reached, half of Stradbroke Island could be transitioned to National Park straight away, while protecting jobs and the future aspirations of the local community.
